About our Speakers

Zeina Allouche is the Manager of the Centre for Learning and Performance at Concordia University. An oral history/autoethnography storyteller, Zeina has worked for more than 20 years in the field of child protection especially with children forced to separate from their families. She has contributed to international initiatives to promote family strengthening aiming at preventing separation, participated in the drafting of the Guidelines for the Alternative Care for Children (2009), and established an NGO based in Lebanon to advocate for the rights to origins for the survivors who were illegally adopted out during the wartime.

Emanuelle Dufour is a postdoctoral fellow at the Interuniversity Centre for Indigenous Studies and Research (CIÉRA). Emanuelle received a PhD in Art Education from Concordia University, which focused on the creation of a collaborative comic book involving over fifty Indigenous and

non-Indigenous contributors. The comic book, titled "C'est le Québec qui est né dans mon pays!": Carnet de rencontres d'Ani Kuni à Kiuna (2021), was later published by Éditions Écosociété. She also holds a master's degree in Anthropology from the Université de Montréal, which focused on Indigenous cultural security in postsecondary education contexts in Quebec, with a particular interest in the history of First Nations education self-determination movements. In addition to working as an illustrator and graphic facilitator for various projects with different First Nations groups and organizations, she works as a lecturer in the DESS program in Indigenous Narratives and Media at UdeM and at the École d'études autochtones de l'UQAT, as well as an Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion pedagogical advisor at Collège Ahuntsic
